




Funny walls





The Black Hole of Calcutta


In 1756, the ruler, or *Nawab*, of Bengal captured Calcutta from the British. He took 146 prisoners and locked them overnight in a small, hot cell, with little ventilation and no water. Only 23 survived what has gone down in history as the 'Black Hole of Calcutta'.




Soldiers, mail coaches, funerals and local vicars travel for FREE.





Josiah Wedgwood owned a big factory where he produced pottery in a classical style.


This piece was based on a famous Roman vase, which showed scenes from ancient myths.

> tea, which had become the height of fashion.




